

Scouting "joins" World Balloon Attempt

-World Scouting News

American Steve Fossett announced that he will make his fourth attempt to circumnavigate the earth in a balloon. If all goes well, he will depart in August from Argentina on a voyage that will take about 18 days. The side of his capsule will bear the universal World Scout emblem.

If he succeeds, he will not only be the first in the world to do so, he will also set the record for the longest solo flight by a pilot of any type of aircraft.

"Some say this is the greatest un-achieved goal of aviation," Fossett told the 2,000 leaders attending the National Meeting of the Boy Scouts of America in May in San Antonio, Texas. "Balloons were the first form of aviation, dating from 1783, yet it is the only form of aviation that has not made it around the world."

An editor of National Geographic once told him that he was like a Boy Scout, always working on another merit {achievement} badge. "That's fair enough," Fossett agreed, "if there is a common thread through all my activities it is personal achievement. It started with working my way up through the Scouting ranks to become an Eagle Scout." From there his life has been filled with many more personal and professional achievements. "As with my previous attempts, I have made the unusual decision not to accept sponsorship, unlike all of my competitors."

"If I am successful and fly this balloon across the south Atlantic, Indian Ocean, Australia, the southern Pacific, and to a landing in the Pampas of Argentina, you will not see an advertising banner but rather the symbols of what I want to stand for. You will find the American Flag, the Explorers Club Flag, and the emblem of World Scouting."

The capsule for his last attempt carried a smaller version of the World Scout Emblem. The capsule was on display for a few months in the Aeronautical and Space museum in Washington DC, along side other aviation pioneers.

"I want a better Scouting emblem for this flight," he told Jacques Moreillon, Secretary General of World Scouting, "because I'm planning on winning and the capsule will be on display for a very long time." His flight in 1997 started in St. Louis and ended in southern Russia, achieving the second longest balloon flight in aviation history, exceeded only by his own journey earlier in the same year from St. Louis to India, a distance of 10,361 miles (16,674 kilometers).

The round the world flight requires winter winds for speed and lack of thunderstorms. The southern hemisphere winter is June through August and offers more consistent jet streams and no problems getting permission to fly over only 4 or 5 countries. This was a major problem in his past flights in the northern hemisphere. Unfortunately, most of the flight is over water, outside of shipping routes, and the stormy winter seas present a real danger if an ocean rescue is needed.

"That's adventure: facing the unknowns and the hardships to do something that has never been done," he says, "most of us want some adventure in our lives. For me it started in that Boy Scout Troop in Garden Grove, California....how fortunate I was to be in a troop with a strong camping program and to get started on my adventures at that early age." 2007 Launched at Royal Celebration of Scouting

A "Celebration of Scouting" described the gala evening in May organized in London by the World Scout Foundation and The Scout Association of the United Kingdom. It was attended by 300 people, including many Baden Powell Fellows, from 25 countries.

The event launched the campaign to celebrate Scouting's 100th birthday in 2007. The setting was in the grand hall of the Natural History Museum. The reception was attended by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, Patron of The Scout Association, accompanied by HRH The Duke of Edinburgh. The event was hosted jointly by His Majesty King Carl XVI Gustaf of Sweden, Honorary President of the World Scout Foundation, and HRH The Duke of Kent, President of the Scout Association of the UK. Distinguished guests

included HM King Constantine and HM Queen Anne-Marie. Talented Scouts from throughout the UK entertained the guests with music and dancing, demonstrating an often understated creative aspect of

Scouting.

In the two days following the gala event, many guests joined special tours to Brownsea Island, the

birthplace of Scouting in 1907, and to Gilwell Park, the historic training centre of The Scout Association.

Scouting to Celebrate 100 Years in 2007

The first day of August, 2007, will be celebrated as the official 100th Anniversary of Scouting.

For many years 1st August has been celebrated as the date of Scouting's founding, even though later dates marked the steps of its formal or legal creation in the United King-dom, and internationally.

On 1st August 1907, Robert Baden-Powell opened his experimental camp for 20 boys on Brownsea Island, near Poole in Dorset, on the Southeast coast of England. The camp lasted nine days and proved to Baden-Powell that his methods for educating young people were appealing, and effective.

In January 1908 he published the first chapter of "Scouting for Boys", a book issued in fortnightly parts at four pence each. It was an immediate success.

He had only intended to provide a method of training boys which could be adopted by existing youth organizations. To his surprise, youngsters started to organize themselves into what was destined to become the world's largest voluntary youth movement.
